The wound was in
the hip & Buchan complained
of pain in the stomach. Wheeler
helped him from shell hole to
shell hole until he met some
R.A.M. men who carried Buchan
down to the dressing station where
he was under the care of the
batt. Doctor.

Others saw Mr. Buchan
after he was wounded, these
are

Pte. 4006 R. Fletcher who saw
him between the 2nd & 3rd German lines
but not afterwards, the Doctor, and,
I believe, Mr. Carnan.

Capt. Ferguson informs
me that Buchan died 2 hrs. after
his arrival at the clearing
station, ^{which is} on the main road to

Mr. Buchan reached the
3rd German trench. He turned
back to see what was wrong
with 556 platoons who seemed
to be slightly confused with
some of 'A' Coy.
